Are you an Indigenous researcher working in a STEM related field?

Would you like to hone your presentation and interview skills?

Are you interested in developing your research profile by working with the media?

This exciting opportunity from the Australian Science Media Centre (AusSMC) and NITV/SBS will train a small group of early to mid-career Indigenous researchers in media and presentation skills and provide them with the opportunity to talk about their work with a variety of media outlets.

Participants will engage in a two-day media training program in Sydney, gaining practical hands on media experience with media partner NITV/SBS, mentoring from Indigenous researchers and journalists, and dedicated media training. Graduates from the program will receive ongoing mentoring from the AusSMC, and media opportunities with NITV/SBS and other media partners (The Sydney Morning Herald, The Conversation, the ABC etc).

The program will run on 10-11 February 2020.

This opportunity is open to you if you:

- Identify as Indigenous
- Are an ECR or MCR (or have equivalent research experience)
- · Are actively engaged in research
- Have a position or affiliation with an Australian university or research institute
- Can fund or part fund your travel and accommodation costs for the two-day training in Sydney
- Are keen to communicate your research to the public via the media
